Greetings from a very green and lush Zambezi Valley!

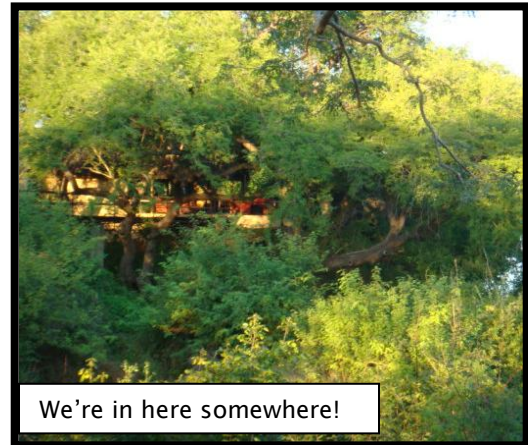
Never having seen the Valley at this time of year and after such a tremendous rainy season, I am in complete awe of the emerald green blanket that just seems to have covered the entire area.

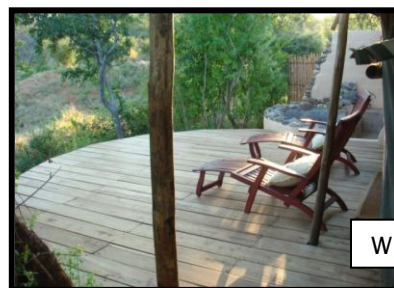

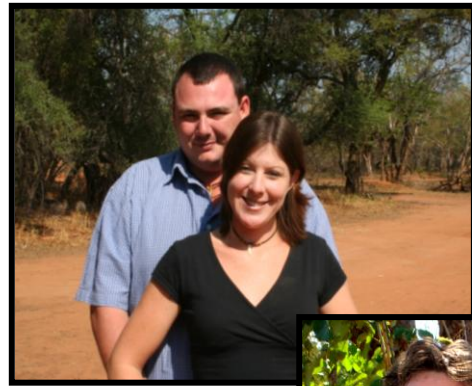
